ABSTRACT

Through the proliferation of rape videos, morphed images, etc, the internet is witnessing increasing instances of violence against women. As websites sometimes claim to be intermediaries which cannot be always held responsible for the nature of content uploaded online, the issue of intermediary liability needs to be addressed urgently. The precedent set by the Supreme Court in this regard in certain cases merits critical examination, in order to pave the way forward for developing an alternate intermediate liability regime, which can walk the tightrope between censorship and the protection of the dignity of women and children in cyberspace.

Burden of Child Malnutrition in India: A View from

ABSTRACT

In India, monitoring and surveillance of health and well-being indicators have been focused primarily on the state and district levels. Analysing population data at the level of parliamentary constituencies has the potential to bring political accountability to the data-driven policy discourse that is currently based on district-level estimates. Using data from the fourth National Family Health Survey 2016, two geographic information systems methodologies have been developed and applied to provide estimates of four child malnutrition indicators (stunting, underweight, wasting, and anemia) for the 543 parliamentary constituencies in India.

ABSTRACT

Tamil Nadu is recognised for its achievements in human development, especially in the area of healthcare. In light of the central government's recent move to launch insurance-based targeted healthcare provision, a case is made for paying attention to building public health infrastructure based on Tamil Nadu's experience with healthcare provisioning. The pitfalls of insurance-based provisioning and targeting, and the need to recognise regional trajectories and institutional innovations in this regard are highlighted.

 Analysing Male and Female parents' incentives vis-à-vis gender sensitisation in urban Rajasthan, Written by – Shailja Khanduri & Nikita Goel

ABSTRACT

This paper discusses characteristic gender inequality issues and analyses the effect of gender and education of parents on the same. The study also analyses some of the social and economic aspects of urban adult population in urban Rajasthan. The results show that a girl's future progress is positively associated with the education of her parents. Further, the difference in outlook towards girl child's social status (in comparison to male sibling) is associated with the education level of the parents and is not gender specific. A remarkable conclusion of the study is no statistically significant association of education or gender of parent on the girl child's future independence. The awareness about the gender inequality issues is not gender specific. However, the study identifies a worrying sign that only about 50% urban parents were aware of gender inequality issues.

 Women folk painters empowered : a revolution in a rural setting, Written by – Sharmila Chandra

ABSTRACT

The question of women empowerment is undoubtedly a critical issue, particularly in developing countries like India where women are regarded as inferior citizens, dominated by the menfolk. Choice of opportunity to work is a major dimension of human development. The objective of this paper is to ascertain the socio-economic position of women in the *patua* (folk-painter) *community* of West Medinipur District in West Bengal. The study is based on Naya, a newly emerging *patua village*. Both primary and secondary sources of information form the database. The research has revealed that in the last two decades, in Naya, training sessions have led to the emergence of young women as talented *women patuas*, who are not only earning a decent income in their own right, but are also helping to support their own families.
