ABSTRACT

The phenomenal increase in institutional births in India has been accompanied by a disturbing rise in caesarean section deliveries. The prevalence of, reasons for, and consequences of c-section deliveries in the town of Kulgam in Jammu and Kashmir are studied. The findings not only reveal an alarmingly high prevalence of c-section deliveries in the town, but also that these deliveries are being largely performed without medical indications, adversely affecting the health of women. In order to monitor and control c-section deliveries in the country, immediate policy interventions are required.

 Male-Female wage gap and informal employment in Bangladesh : A Quantile Regression Approach, Written by – Mustafizur Rahman & Md. Al-Hasan

ABSTRACT

This article undertakes an examination of Bangladesh's latest available Quarterly Labour Force Survey 2015–2016 data to draw in-depth insights on gender wage gap and wage discrimination in Bangladesh labour market. The mean wage decomposition shows that on average a woman in Bangladesh earns 12.2 per cent lower wage than a man, and about half of the wage gap can be explained by labour market discrimination against women. Quantile counterfactual decomposition shows that women are subject to higher wage penalty at the lower deciles of the wage distribution with the wage gap varying between 8.3 per cent and 19.4 per cent at different deciles

 <u>The Paradox of Declining Female Work Participation in</u> an Era of Economic Growth, Written by – Sonalde Desai & Omkar Joshi

<u>ABSTRACT</u>

The past three decades have seen the advent of major transformations in the Indian

economy. The economy has achieved average growth rates of 5–9%, education has risen sharply for both men and women, fertility rates have declined, and infrastructure facilities, particularly access to electricity, cooking gas and piped water, have improved. All these factors are expected to reduce the demand for women's time spent in domestic chores and increase their opportunities for paid work. Paradoxically, however, the National Sample Surveys document a substantial decline in women's work participation rates (WPRs), particularly for rural women. Optimistic interpretation of these trends suggests that increasing prosperity accounts for women's labour force withdrawal. For young women, rising school and college enrolment is incompatible with demands of the workforce.

 <u>Quality of Informal Jobs in India's Banking Sector : A</u> <u>Primary Study through the 'Decent Work' Framework,</u> <u>Written by – Nitu Jaiswal</u>

<u>ABSTRACT</u>

"Decent Work" is International Labour Organization's (ILO) umbrella strategy to promote the "quality of work/job" for all, which is aimed at more productive, well-remunerative and better quality jobs. However, the prevalence of informal employment and growing "informalization" of jobs indicate a general deterioration in the quality of work. The present study, based on a primary survey of employees in banking sector, shows that the "decent work" framework has had limited influence on the growing nonstandard forms of employment (NSFE) in India. Even in a sector like banking, which is considered more formal and regulated, jobs fell short of "decent work" criteria.

 Agency, Empowerment and Intra-household gender relations in Bangladesh : Does market-oriented microcredit contribute?, Written by – Md. Al-Amin & Golam M. Mathbor

<u>ABSTRACT</u>

This article seeks to probe the influence of microcredit on the development of agency and empowerment of poor women in rural Bangladesh. The study was conducted on the clients of two leading NGOs—Grameen Bank (GB) and Bangladesh Rural Advancement Committee (BRAC)—in Bangladesh. The qualitative findings of the ethnographic study confirmed that poor women's involvement in microcredit programs does not contribute to the development of their agency and empowerment in a transformative sense due to structural problems in the programs and the patriarchal social structure of Bangladesh.

 <u>Discourses of victimhood and agency : A case study of</u> teenage Indian girl negotiating her identity in a gendered world, Written by – Disha Maheshwari

ABSTRACT

In this paper, I report on the case of a young Indian adolescent girl, Anita (a pseudonym), and explore how she constructs and negotiates her various identities. Using discourse analysis, in particular the concept of positioning, I examine how Anita locates herself in the period of transition between childhood and adulthood, while drawing on various notions of gender and sexuality available to her in the specific social context of her school in India. The specific focus of examination is Anita's identity construction in relation to ideas of victimization and agency, which are seen to run parallel with each other.

 <u>Determinants of Choice of Care Providers During</u> <u>Childbirth in Rural West Bengal, India.</u> Written by – <u>Mampi Bose</u>

ABSTRACT

The article analyses determinants of choice of care providers during childbirth. Public health facilities provide care for free to all women during childbirth in West Bengal. In addition, a cash incentive is also attached with the service package for poor women who give birth at public health facilities. However, a section of women still prefer to give birth at home and some avail services from private facilities. The article attempts to explore the reasons underlying such difference. This analysis is based on primary data collected from four villages of Jalpaiguri district following multistage sampling method. It involved a survey of 251 households having at least one child below 2 years.

 <u>Developmental Screening of Children of Migrant</u> <u>Construction Workers in Mumbai, Written by – Vrishali</u> <u>Pispati, Asmita Naik Africawala & Shiny Varghese</u>

<u>ABSTRACT</u>

Development of each child is unique to themselves after birth. Socio-cultural factors, parenting behaviour and childhood nutrition are known to influence development during early childhood years. This study aimed to assess whether the development of children of migrant construction workers attending Mumbai Mobile Creches daycare centres was on track and to identify children with a risk of developmental delay. Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR) psychosocial screening test was used to screen 792 children. The test measures abilities in five areas of development, namely gross motor, vision and fine motor, hearing language and concept development and social skills and personal skills.
