ABSTRACT

A transformation of the rural employment structure of the Indian state of Uttar Pradesh has seen a movement of workers from agriculture to non-agricultural sectors, which was contingent upon regional and individual characteristics. The share of casual workers in non-farm employment grew steadily, especially in the construction sector. Almost 90% of casual labourers belonged to either the Schedule Castes/Scheduled Tribes or Other Backward Castes. This study confirms that the conversion of cultivators, especially small and medium farmers into casual labourers, implies distress-driven diversification.

ABSTRACT

This article seeks to understand under-representation of women in the top managerial positions in Sri Lanka's public banking sector and how HRM practices at the workplace impact their careers. The narratives of women bank managers show that they possess skills, confidence and a desire to climb up the career ladder. However, women's ambitions for managerial positions and promotion to decision-making levels are implicitly limited by the state bureaucracy. Organizations need to establish and maintain better human resource practices and organizational culture for gender equality as well as organizational effectiveness.

ABSTRACT

Various estimates of impoverishment on account of out-of-pocket expenditure (OOPE) on health are available for India, covering different time periods, but there is a void in terms of comparable estimates. This article uses national level surveys conducted by National Sample Survey Organization for measurement of living standards (Consumption Expenditure Survey [CES]) for 2004–2005 and 2011–2012 and Health and Morbidity Survey (HMS) for 2004 and 2014 to quantify the trends in impoverishment estimates over time and identify the factors explaining these trends.

 Theorising the gig economy and home-based service work, By – Frances Flanagan

ABSTRACT

The history of domestic servants in Australia offers a provocative challenge to the prophets of the digital gig economy. Like home-based service workers today, 19th-and 20th-century domestic servants worked without the protection of minimum wages or hours, unions or independent arbitration and endured perpetually porous boundaries between their work and non-working time, low status and pay. This article argues that digital platforms are instruments of a fundamental shift in the governance of home-based service work, from a system of 'dyadic' to one of 'structural' domination. Intermediaries played virtually no role in the operation of the former system, but they play a fundamental role in the latter, as aggregators of data about workers' responsiveness and speed that enable market-based disciplinary mechanisms to operate without reference to public law and across a much larger spatial context than was previously possible.
