This study attempts to understand the extent of acceptance of daughters in selected high and low son preference states of India by using data from District Level Household and Facility Survey (DLHS) 3 and 4. Understanding the characteristics of the couples who have stopped childbearing only with daughters provide insights about the prevailing norms on acceptance of daughters. The results revealed that, from DLHS 3 to 4, there is an increasing trend in the daughter preference in both high and low son preference states.

• Dropout Behaviour of Children: The Case of West Bengal, Written by - Amita Majumder & Chayanika Mitra

#### <u>ABSTRACT</u>

This article examines the dropout behaviour of students below class 10 level (maximum age of 16 years) from two different perspectives. First, from the parents' perspective, we identify the major characteristics of a household that forces the child to dropout from school, using a Probit analysis. Second, from the child's perspective, we try to relate the reasons for dropping out (as specified by the child) with the background of the household the child belongs to and the school infrastructure provided to him/her, through a multinomial logit model. The data set used is the 71st round (January 2014 to June 2014) data on education expenditure and is provided by the National Sample Survey Office (NSSO). The analysis is done for the state of West Bengal, India, separately for boys and girls.

 <u>Child Marriage Among Girls in India: Prevalence, Trends</u> and Socio-Economic Correlates, Written by – Pintu Paul

## ABSTRACT

This article examines prevalence of child marriage among girls in India, its trends and socio-economic correlates. It is based on data extracted from the

National Family Health Survey (NFHS). This analysis shows that the prevalence of marriage among female children has considerably declined between 1992–1993 (NFHS-1) and 2015–2016 (NFHS-4). Its incidence by age cohorts also shows a significant reduction during the recent period. However, child marriage is persistent among uneducated, poor and rural women. The results of multivariate logistic regression reveal that the educational attainment and wealth status of the household are the most significant correlates of female child marriage in India. Girls and young women with secondary and higher educational levels are less likely to be married before 18 years compared to the uneducated ones.

### ABSTRACT

The COVID-19 pandemic is considered to have already negatively impacted upon all four dimensions of food security as defined by the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations. The subsequent lockdown in India to restrict social contact and spread of the disease has caused disruption to economic activity and has created widespread unemployment in the informal sector. It is anticipated to give rise to the adoption of coping strategies by the most vulnerable, which is likely to be accompanied by a decline in nutritional status. The bailout package announced in this context is insufficient to meet the needs of Indian citizens.

#### ABSTRACT

This article analyses the status of nutrition in relation to the status of poverty among the socio-economic groups in both rural as well as in urban India. It also examines the role of public distribution system (PDS) along with other socio-economic factors in the reduction of nutrition insecurity of poor as well as non-poor households on the basis of National Sample Survey Office (NSSO) unit level data of Consumer Expenditure Survey of the latest rounds. It was found that the incidence of poverty as well as nutrition insecurity has declined significantly in the country during the years 2004–2005 and 2011–2012. However, as much as 24.4 per cent non-poor households in 2011–2012 remained nutritionally insecure.
