Introduction

The **Institute of Social Studies Trust (ISST)**, a non-profit non-governmental organisation, was set up in 1964 as a society and was registered as a Trust in 1980. ISST is dedicated to conducting research and action programmes to promote social justice and equity for the underprivileged, with a focus on women. ISST seeks to link research with grassroots activism and policy debates through various mechanisms.

ISST's community outreach programme was initiated in 2000 in three slum communities in the Trans Yamuna region: West Vinod Nagar resettlement colony, Sonia camp and Nehru camp. The centre at Sonia camp is located in *Harijan Basti*, whilst Nehru camp has been given two rooms at the *Sarkari Vikas Kendra*. In 2006, the SAATHI Youth Resources Centre opened in Kalyanpuri. Currently, the majority of the programme's activities are carried out at the SAATHI Centre, with the centre in West Vinod Nagar set to merge with it by April 2008.

The **community outreach programme** functions to provide:

- Non-formal education for school drop-outs
- Remedial education for school-going children
- Adult education for women and young girls
- Income generating activities
- Awareness raising on health, sanitation, cleanliness
- Legal awareness camps / health camps
- Facilitation of the delivery of government services
- Exposure trips for women and children



Life Skills Training Workshop

ISST's community outreach programme seeks to engage with individuals and communities through holistic education, awareness-raising, and skill-building activities in order to enable individuals to better understand their environments, make the best possible decisions for the use of their resources and enhance quality of life for themselves, their families and their communities. The programme's main focus has been the empowerment of young people through an 'Information, Education and Dialogue' approach.

Our Vision: We envision the creation of a space that is inclusive, approachable and accessible, in order to achieve equity, equality and to promote lives of autonomy and dignity.

Our Mission: Our mission is to provide timely and regular input on various issues concerning youth and adolescents, such as education (particularly for girls and economically disadvantaged groups), health, the Public Distribution System, and legal and human rights, including advocacy for the appropriate implementation of provisions and delivery of government services.

Major activities at Saathi Centre (Kalyanpuri) and Apni Phulwari (Sonia Camp):

- RTI helpdesk and awareness building
- Bachpan (0-14 years)
- Performing arts (theatre and music class)
- Youth discussion group
- Workshop on current issues
- Comics workshop
- Counseling

Right to Information

Work related to Right to Information (RTI), in the period from November'09 till October'10, comprised of mainly the following three activities:

- RTI Help Desk
- RTI Camp
- RTI Training Workshop

Through the above three activities, we aim at awareness generation, capacity building of people regarding using RTI and providing constant support and problem solving while filing a RTI application. As a result, the three activities are interrelated and act complementary to each other.



Right to Information Camp

RTI help desk is scheduled as twice a week i.e. Monday and Thursday from 2pm to 3:30pm, wherein people can walk in and file a RTI application or file a follow up on a previous application, second appeal. The activity also involves discussing the problems as well as developing awareness among the applicant regarding the benefits of Right to Information Act. In the given period of twelve months, 98 RTI applications (Annexure 1 (a)) have been filed by the residents of Kalanpuri, Khichripur, Trilopuri and nearby areas in East Delhi. Most of the complaints are made regarding problems related to ration shops and ration card and schooling (birth certificate, caste certificate, ladli scheme), etc. Complaints related to domestic violence by husband, in-laws or children increased in number over the year and form a significant number. Also, many RTI applications

were filed as follow up for F.I.R. complaints given in the police stations. Some complaints were made directly against the police officials like in once incidence the police picked up few women from the colony and locked them in the station without presence of any women constable or officer. People in the area have started using RTI for many diverse reasons. It is significant to note that the awareness among people regarding RTI Act is increasing, as also evident from the increase in the numbers and outreach of the works of RTI application at the RTI help desk.

Two RTI camps have been organized by ISST-COP in the given year, one each in Kalyanpurui and Khichripur. The first camp was organized in Kalyanpuri on 27th February 2010 as a means to create awareness regarding RTI, a tool for demanding information from concerned governmental agencies. A total of 68 RTI applications (Annexure 1 (b)) were filed during the camp, by residents from Kalyanpuri, Trilokpuri and Indira Camp. The applications were directed to various concerned departments, mainly JJ and slum department (36), MCD (9), Police (8), Ration office (7), Education (5), PWD (1) and others.

The second camp was organized on 17th September 2010 at Kali Mandir, 5th block Khichripur. This was the first time that a camp was set up in Khichripur, also with an aim of spreading awareness about RTI in the area. It has been observed that the people from Khichripur find it difficult to come to Kalyanpuri and therefore remain ignorant of such activities. About 20 RTI applications were filed and many more enquiries were made. After the workshop, many people from Khichripur have started coming to RTI Helpdesk as well. A total of 20 RTI applications (Annexure 1 (b)) were filed during the camp, by the residents. The applications were on complaints/ delays regarding ration cards (14), ID Proof (6) and pension (1).

Two RTI workshops have been conducted over the year. Owing to the demands from the youth, one **RTI training workshop** was also organized on 7th March, 2010 in Sonia Camp. It

was attended by 25 youth members (Annexure 1 (c)). The youth in Sonia Camp are taking initiative and are willing to enhance their competence for the purpose of independently engaging with their problems and issues. The workshop was aimed at building awareness and capacity regarding aspects related to RTI Act. They were also explained, with lived examples, the expected problems that one might face while filing and following up on RTI. In the past, youth from Sonia Camp have used RTI, with the help of ISST's staff, to resolve their problems regarding ration shop (success story). Emerging leadership is the most evident phenomena at present among the youth in Sonia Camp, where the youth are active in demanding their dutiful rights like ration, infrastructure developments, and education.

The second RTI workshop was conducted by two of our staff members from 11th August'10 to 13th August'10 in Almora, Uttarakhand organized by Uttarakhand Seva Nidhi. The organization invited our staff to conduct the workshop on RTI and its application as they plan to use RTI as an advocacy tool for their work in the area. There were about 40 women participants at the workshop. The workshop was planned in an interactive way, along with planned activities in order to simulate actual situations and experiences. Therefore, writing applications and appeals was a crucial session at the workshop. It was a learning experience for both, the trainers as well as the trainees.

Some of the success stories (given in a later section) illustrate the ways in which people have used this tool.

Bachpan

Bachpan programme was started as a response to 'felt need' by the staff as well as an 'expressed concern' by the community in response to increasing involvement of youth in crime incidences in the area. As a result of rigorous understand and brainstorming by the staff, it was realized that there is a direct correlation between increasing dropout rate of children (from formal schools) and increasing crime rate in the area. Therefore, Bachpan programme was started in Sonia Camp in 2001 and in Kalyanpuri in 2006 as a means to intervene with the children at a younger age so as to address the problem and cater to the needs to these children.

Children, from 0-14 years, are catered via this programme but effectively children from 3-14 years participate. It aims at providing non-formal education to children (preschoolers, school going, non school going and drop outs) and support with regular studies, to look after their age specific developmental needs. Some of the activities that have been undertaken under the bachpan programme from November '09 till October '10 are:

- Bal Manch;
- Drawing and Singing Competition;
- Exposure Trip;
- Film Screening;
- Conducting activities aimed at providing value education;
- Enrollment of children in government and

- private schools;
- Outreach for increasing the participation of girls who come with siblings.

The two most significant progresses have been with respect to: **increasing number of young girls who get their younger siblings** and **reaching out to children in 18th block of Kalyanpuri.**

It is during classes of Bachpan Programme that the two groups participate and interact with the Centre. Both the changes are results of conscious as well as constant efforts made by the staff to encourage these children from the community, who have never been enrolled in school or dropped out early. As a result of frequent interactions with their families, many young girls and children from tribal community have now started coming to the centre to learn. Some of them have also got admission in schools now.

The activities for the school going children mainly involve support classes in Hindi, English and Mathematics with value education activities. With the preschoolers and children who have never been to school, activities are aimed at improving their concentration, developing interest in studying, basic learning, developing healthy day to day habits. For children who are drop outs, a more focused and specific plan is developed by the staff, in order to either mainstream the child again or help him develop some vocational skills to increase his/her employability. In the past six months, enrollment of girls has increased from 31 to 57 and for boys 33 to 50 and the number has remained constant thereafter. Though, the children don't remain the same.

Bal Manch is a new activity started from the month March'10. It includes several activities organized for and by the children, based on specific themes, in a festive way. The first Bal Manch, in the month of March, 2010, had its theme 'sports' with racing competition (frog race, lemon-spoon race) and cultural activities. Many games were organized for the children to encourage children to involve themselves in outdoor activities. Through such activities,

developing concentration and instilling a spirit of sportsmanship was also aimed. Second Bal Manch was organized around the theme of 'environment', organized on 30th April, 2010. On the occasion, children prepared a play depicting negative impact of deforestation. The space was decorated according to the theme and the characters from the play were dressed according to their specific roles. This was followed by songs on environment and snacks. 'Sports' was the theme of balmanch in July'10, based on the earlier experience. It immediately caught children's attention and enthusiasm. Many indoor and outdoor games were organized for children, according to age groups. At the end of the event prizes were distributed to the winners and refreshment for all. In the month of August'10, 'Raksha Bandhan' was the theme and activities were organized around this. Children make rachis (art and craft) and also learnt the reason for making and tying rakhi. Independence Day was also celebrated by children. In the morning, children painted flags and performed dances and group songs in the afternoon, as part of the cultural programme. In September' 10, teachers day was celebrated. Also Janmashtami was also celebrated by the children where children organized as well as participated in the cultural programme. All the children were dressed in pair as 'Radha- Krishana'. Dances, songs and storytelling were organized at the cultural event. As October month is full of festivals and celebrations. Therefore, balmach was organized with the theme of Vijayadashmi and Ramayana.

Children are always very excited about this event and take part in activities enthusiastically. As activities vary in every Bal Manch, children get a

chance to experiment and exhibit their talent in various fields like theatre, games, singing, dance, etc.

Drawing and singing competitions were organized on the republic day and Independence Day. Children participated very enthusiastically as they love to draw and colour. Prizes were distributed at the end of the event.

An **exposure trip** was also organized on 3rd April, 2010 to Rajghat and India Gate for about 70 children. Everyone went in a bus and later enjoyed a meal together. Children thoroughly enjoyed the swings at Children's park and swimming at the lake at India Gate. They thoroughly enjoyed themselves as it was first visit for many of them.

First Saturday of every month is scheduled as a **'movie Saturday'** for the children. Children saw movies: Hanuman and Jungle book for the month of March'10. Children are now scheduled to watch 'Bhoothnath' during Summer Camp. Due to some reason, the staff has not been able to be regular with movie screenings.

Enrolling 6 year olds as well as drop outs in school is an ever continuing task undertaken by the staff as this is seen as a very crucial step in a child's life. This includes getting birth certificates, income certificate, caste certificate, filing RTI applications, helping parents in availing the freeship quota in private schools. About 15-20 children have been already enrolled this year. Besides these, various activities are conducted with children, using play and learn method, like indoor and outdoor games, role plays aimed at

inculcating good values and habits on a day to day basis.

Performing Arts: Theatre Group and Music Class

The **theatre group Nakshatra** performed the play '*Katputli*' on the inauguration of ISST Gender Resource Centre in Kalyanpuri on 13th January, 2010, chief guest Sandeep Dixit, MP. The play's theme was violence against women, emphasizing the importance of empowerment of women. The younger members of Nakshatra group sang a song, '*geet ga rahe hai aaj hum...*' a motivating song about progress and development of society.

Nakshatra was also invited to perform '*Aao haath milayein*' on 20th January, 2010 in a programme organized by Vidya Devi, Municipal Councilor, Kalyanpuri.

The group has had two trainings in April, 2010, conducted by its senior group members. A 15 day training workshop was organized during May, 2010 with a resource person. At the end of the workshop children prepared a play on the issue of naxalism and its various realities. This was performed at one college and one park. Another theatre workshop was conducted by a volunteer with the younger children at the centre during May- June, 2010.

The members of the theatre group meet regularly to discuss various scripts and do theatre activities for further enhanced learning. They rehearsed and performed the play on RTI at various locations in Kalyanpuri to spread awareness. It is important to note that this group is mainly self driven by the members of the group with minimal support from ISST staff and it still remains as the most favourite activity among the youth, instilling confidence and leadership among them.

10 day music and singing workshop was also organized in May, 2010 by Mr. Virendra Negi for youth. On the last day of the workshop, a

small singing competition was also organized and prizes were distributed. Some of the participants found the workshop very helpful and encouraging.

Discussion Group

Discussion group is a much awaited event of every month where youth gets to discuss and argue various perspectives on a pre decided topic. Besides the nature of discussions that happen at these discussions, the topics selected by the youth also reflect pertinent issues which are occupying their minds. There have been a total of seven group discussions, six at Kalyanpuri and one at Sonia Camp, in the past six months.

ENVIRONMENT, 30TH NOVEMBER, 2009

Issues related to causes and effects of pollution were discussed by the participants. One of the most evident effects of pollution is difficulty in breathing and increasing cases of respiratory diseases. Participants also discussed the long term disastrous impacts of environmental pollution like melting of glaciers and subsequent rise in water levels of oceans. Finally, precautions and steps that we can take, in order to protect our environment, were listed as:

- Planting trees
- Restricting use of polythene bags in our day to day lives
- Increased usage of CNG instead of other fuels like petrol and diesel

VALUE OF MONEY, 12TH DECEMBER, 2009

In today's world, money has become a need for everyone's survival. All of us have a desire to

own more and more money but we don't trust anyone with our money. This has led to mistrust and dishonesty in society. Therefore, importance of striking the right balance was emphasized. Both, rich as well as poor should respect money and people. Therefore, both should work hard and earn; spend their hard earned money wisely; and

VIOLENCE, 1ST JANUARY, 2010

An innovative technique of group discussion was used this time in order to liven up the discussion. Participants were divided in five groups and asked to discuss and write on the following three questions related to violence:

- What is violence?
- What factors lead to violence?
- How can we curb violence?

Then the groups presented their views (from the write up) based on the kind of discussion they had in their respective group. In the end, the group concluded that most of the incidences of violence occur due to anger (*krodh*). Therefore, one must try to control their anger.

SHORTAGE OF WATER, 30TH JANUARY 2010, SONIA CAMP

Youth is much worried about the shortage and irregular supply of water in the area as well as in our country at large. One of the main causes identified by the participants was unwise use of water. People often assume that water is an unlimited resource which determines the amount of water they use. For eg. Most of us use a bucket of water for a task where we require only a mug, taps are left open. Women waste a lot of water by repeatedly trying to clean the road. Therefore, some of ways by which we can save water are: use water judiciously; collect rain water; plant more and more trees; do not put cement by cutting the roots of a plant as roots cannot breathe otherwise. One of them said that if we do not act now, it will have dangerous repercussions very soon.

RIGHT TO INFORMATION, 26TH FEBRUARY, 2010

The discussion began with discussing 'democracy'. It started from saying text book definition of democracy to critically

understanding its meaning. It was felt that there is a need to restore democracy in our country today. This will further require transparency by the system. Therefore, Right to Information Act, 2005 provides us with some empowering tools which can be used to bring more transparency and efficiency in the system by a co-ordinate effort. Benefits and processes of Right to Information formed the later part of the discussion.

VALUE OF TIME, MARCH, 2010

Since youth spend their time by engaging in various activities these days, it was considered important to discuss the value of time and how one can maximize on the limited available time. One should lead a disciplined life in order to understand the value of time. Each minute holds great value and in today's fast paced world, so much can happen in a minute that one must value every second. Even Gandhi ji was very particular about time. Therefore, everyone should now try to be punctual and start with being punctual for the class at Saathi centre.

SWARAJ, DISCUSSION OF MOVIE 'HIBDE BAZAAR', 29TH APRIL, 2010

The concept of 'Swaraj' was made famous by Mahatma Gandhi who believed that power should be in the hands of the people. Youth were almost amazed at this novel understanding of governance since their understanding of governance is rather understood by words like power, corruption, vote bank, etc. They were very motivated after getting introduced to the concept as well as seeing it as applicable through the movie which is based on a true story. When youth were told that the money that government is spending is our money, they were surprised and almost shocked. They were not conscious that everyone pays tax which finally becomes government's money. We pay tax every time we buy something, from a television to a matchbox, anything. Therefore, government is accountable to its people for every action they take. Youth decided to actively participate in Mohalla Sabha/ Swaraj meetings conducted in the area conducted by an NGO Parivartan.

HEALTHY COMPETITION, 31ST MAY 2010

It was felt that 'competition and its ethics' are

constantly understood as well as misunderstood by youth based on their experiences. The participant decided themselves that it is important to debate and relearn 'what is competition? What are its boundaries?' many participants said that competition often affects relationships among people. It is many times harmful. Selfishness is a very crucial emotion that determines the extent to which a person will act. Jealousy is another important emotion which is a result of competition. Therefore, one should measure the gains and losses of competition before acting upon it.

ISSUES IN 18TH BLOCK AND WAY FORWARD, 30TH JUNE 2010

In recent months, many children from 18th block of Kalyanpuri have started coming to the centre. After several visits to 18th block, by the staff, they felt that 18th block has a very unique context as it is a predominantly inhabited by nomadic tribal population from Nasik, whose primary source of livelihood is selling indigenous medicines. Despite living in Delhi for more than two decades now, most of the children have never been to school or accessed other available services like anganwadi etc. Therefore, a discussion with children and youth from 18th Block was scheduled. The issues discussed were: what should we do more to improve our lives? What is the importance of education in ones life, can it change the future? Is gambling the best activity for recreation? Can there be other games which are 'constructive'? It was noticeable that the children and youth from the area have started thinking about themselves and their community, as a result of their consistent interaction with the Saathi centre.

MEANING OF PATRIOTISM IN TODAY'S INDIA, 13TH AUGUST 2010

The discussion started with attempting to answer some questions like: what is patriotism in today's context? What is the meaning of sacrificing life for your country like *jawans*? The second phase of discussion attempted to answer questions like what should/can we do for our country? What are different ways/ fields in which one can excel which will bring pride to our nation? The participants thought that standing against child labour, praying for the *jawans* at the border and

asking for bill of goods we buy from the shop owners are some simple ways that everyone should practice in their day-to-day life. Further ahead, the discussion also included issues of inflation, corruption and how does it affect people. Some of the participants mentioned that the government has increased its expenditure per child in schools which is indicative of government's efforts to make things better. All the children agreed that being pessimistic is not the solution; therefore each person should contribute in every way possible as 'we are the future of our nation.'

COMMON WEALTH GAMES: PROS AND CONS, 31ST AUGUST 2010

The discussion started with sharing information regarding common wealth games, how it started, etc. the participants were very enthusiastic as well as critical of the games. They strongly believed that it is important and beneficial to organize CWG in India. The discomforts of the youth were mainly with the way activities are being carried out and lack of accountability of the CWG organizers. Participants also felt that CWG will be extremely beneficial for the sportsmen in particular but on the other hand the politicians are using corrupt and non-transparent. This discussion was very helpful for the youth as CWG was mostly criticized, ignoring its relevance completely.

GREED AND ITS ILL EFFECTS, 30TH SEPTEMBER 2010

Through our day-to-day interactions with the youth, we felt that it is very important to address 'greed' as it is being increasingly perceived as desirable. Therefore, we decided to have a discussion on the same. The discussion was focused around three ideas mainly, what is greed? What factors/ incidents instigate the emotion of greed? What are the positive and negative factors of greed? The participants debated around the ill effects of being excessively, obsessively greedy. Violence, discrimination, jealousy etc. were understood as manifestations of greed.

IMPACT OF FAMILY ENVIRONMENT AND INTERACTIONS ON CHILDREN, 30TH OCTOBER 2010

Children discussed the ways in which family

environment and interactions impact a child's thinking and mindset. All the children shared that the family environment has a direct co-relation with their well being. Further, they said that these can develop into lifelong behavioral patterns in many cases. Healthy and nurturing environment helps the child to gain confidence in self and do better at studies. Participants were encouraged to make the right choice, despite the hardships, with the help of a story. They understood that they have two choices: to let themselves become delinquent or understand their duties wisely to help their family. All of them agreed that their future depends on the choices they make.

Periodical Workshop On Current Issues

LIFE SKILLS WORKSHOP, APRIL 2010 AND SEPTEMBER 2010

Two life skills workshops, three day each, were organized by ISST staff, for youth on '*Sang- sang jeene ke dhang: life skills training*'. The module of the workshop (Annexure 3) explains various activities that were done with the youth, for training them. The training was done with a focus on relationships and behavior. Adolescents often discuss issues of relationship with friends, family, and relatives with Saathi staff. At this age, adolescent take their first step towards their adult life, various issues related to relationship occupy their mind and thinking. With this aim in mind, the training focused at understanding the dynamics of relationships and attitudes which make relationships positive and negative. It addressed issues like controlling anger (*Krodh*), dealing with peer pressure, aspirations and dreams, etc.



Life Skills Training Workshop

The first workshop was conducted with a mixed group. The second workshop was organized for school dropout youth. It was felt that youth who drop-out of school have no space/ association to learn and think about issues discussed as life skills. It is more crucial for school drop outs than school going youth. Therefore, we decided on the focus of the workshop on drop out youth.

The workshop is designed in a way that participants are rather active, by their involvement in activities and games. Role plays and situational analysis are contextualized to the daily life of the participants which helps them to open up and discuss their problems under guided attention. For example, one of the exercises was to respond to a situation where a group of friends start smoking cigarette and build peer pressure on a fellow friend to join them. Various questions were asked like what you think the fellow friend did. What if he succumbs to the peer pressure? What if he tried to convince his friends to leave this habit? What if he goes tells about this to parents? It was interesting to read their responses where many of them explained that it is difficult to say 'no' to peer pressure or if a friend tells any parent about this, he/she will be beaten up and ostracized by the group immediately. As a result, participants were able to discuss such issues more openly, develop openness with the ISST staff as well.

CRAFT WITH WASTE MATERIAL, 6TH- 9TH OCTOBER 2010



Craft With Waste Material Workshop

A craft workshop was organized from 6th to 9th October 2010 and about 28 participants were taught to make articles using waste materials like making paper Mache articles. They were also

taught to make decorations with old saree or dupatta left unused in the house. The third day they were taught to make coasters with old unused C.D.s. Participants showed great enthusiasm for the idea and craft involved. Some of the articles made were also put up for exhibition-cum-sale at the diwali mela in District Resource Centre (DRC), Mission Convergence, Delhi Government.

ART AND CRAFT WORKSHOP, 21ST -27TH OCTOBER 2010

A 5 day craft workshop was organized for girls and women from Kalyanpuri. Approximately 35 women and girls participated in the workshop. Participants decorated pots, made decorative wall hangings, jute pen stands, painting on cloth. The participants thoroughly enjoyed the workshop.

Counseling

It is an ongoing activity, done by all the staff members, mainly Ms. Amita Joshi and Ms. Manju Negi, as and when required by the child. As the staff say, 'It is our day to day task. When one is working with youth, counseling has to be done at every step, but not in a preaching way.'

Some Success Stories of Our Work With Right To Information Act, 2005

I live with my husband and two children in Kalyanpuri. The problem started when we decided to rebuild our house. My brother-in-law and his wife started fighting with us over property, demanding half share in our house. When we couldn't deal with it on a family level and they started threatening us, we filed F.I.R. with the police at Kalyanpuri police station. Thereafter, my brother-in-law bribed the police and then the police started pestering us instead. After bearing this for a long time, we decided to file RTI application, with the help of Saathi Centre, at the D.C.P. centre to bring to notice the biased attitude and harassment done by the police. The RTI brought the matter into D.C.P.'s notice and the appropriate action was taken. It is when we filed the first appeal that the attitude of the police changed and my brother-in-law stopped threatening us. Now, the solved is solved and it wouldn't have been possible without filing RTI.

- **Meenu**

I am a resident of Harijan Camp, Mandwali of East Delhi. I study in 11th standard in a government school in Mandwali. Residents of Harijan Basti in Mandwali belong to low income group, where people work as rickshaw puller, daily wage labour, vendor, domestic worker, etc for their daily living.

People often face problems like inadequate and irregular ration, ignorance by MCD in maintaining street cleanliness, unreasonable rejection of admissions in government and private schools, problems in getting books and uniforms from government schools. ISST has been working in our area since many years. Through ISST staff, I learned about Right to Information Act, 2006. They informed me about how I can use the Act to gain information related to any government office's activity. ISST supported us in the process of filing Right to Information complaint to solve the problems of my community.

I filed a Right to Information application to gain information regarding the benefits for children belonging to SC/ST/OBC categories like books, uniforms, scholarship money. Besides getting the desired information, I also got to know about the corruption that is involved. Later, I used this information to demand what we are entitled to and helped many of my friends to do the same. After experiencing the empowering benefits of Right To Information 'weapon', I feel that nobody can fool me or my friends now.

- **Ram Asre**

I am a resident of Sonia Camp. The ration shop owner in our area was very corrupt and therefore never used to give our adequate share of ration. Even more, he would refuse to answer when asked why is he doing so and would rather talk rudely to everyone. He opened his shop at his will and was always found drinking alcohol at the shop while working.

When I told my problem to ISST staff, they suggested that I file a Right to Information application regarding this ration shop and its owner. After we filed the Right to Information application, the ration shop owner started harassing us in order to scare us so that we withdraw the application. But the staff supported us in this and helped us to stay determined. After one month of filing of the application, we received a reply of the Right to Information application. Since then, all of us get our ration adequately and timely.

- **Sunil**

I live in a *jhuggi* in Kalyanpuri and we are economically very weak. Getting ration is very important for our family but the ration shop owner always refused ration to us. The owner made a new excuse every time we approached him. So finally we decided to file a RTI application regarding the matter. The same month, in which we filed the RTI, some ration officers visited us and since then we have been getting our ration regularly.

- **Jatan Kaur**

Last year, 2009, I went to L.N.J.P. (government) Hospital in our area (Kalyanpuri)

to get sterilization operation done, under Family Planning Scheme. After a year, I found out that the sterilization operation was rather unsuccessful. It was a very difficult time for me as I was not prepared for the unexpected, unwanted pregnancy which happened due to the failure of sterilization operation. When I went to the hospital to complaint, I read a notice informing that if such an operation fails, one can claim Rs. 30,000 from the hospital under the Family Planning Insurance Scheme.

I filed a Right to Information application demanding information regarding the same like who is responsible for the failure of this operation and who will bear the cost of this failure. In response to this application, I received the due compensation.

- **Kamlesh Gaur**

I used Right to Information Act to teach lesson of a lifetime to a doctor. One day I went to a government dispensary to get check- up done for cough problem. The doctor seemed aged, about 50-55 years old. The doctor, while examining me for the problem in a separate room, misbehaved with me which had a very devastating impact on me, psychologically. For many days, I kept thinking that whose fault is it, could it be my fault, should I tell anyone. I felt, what if he misbehaves with all the women who visit him for medical check- up.

This is when I decided to do something about it and make him realize his mistake. So, I filed a complaint against him but I did not get any response. After this, I filed a Right to Information complaint demanding information regarding action taken in response to my complaint, if any. Very soon, I got a response for my Right to Information complaint and the doctor apologized to me. I felt that he was genuinely regretful of his behavior. He had never imagined that he would be humiliated like this. It was beyond his expectation that a woman will gather such courage to actually complaint against him and confront him.

I feel that every person should stand up and raise their voice against any unjust done to him or in

front of him. Otherwise injustice will become more rampant in our society.

- **Nirmala**

I am a resident of Kalyanpuri. In our area, 12th Block, the main road was in a very bad condition since 2-3 years, with numerous potholes, causing problems to the residents as well as commuters. When I discussed this concern with ISST staff, they told me about Right To Information Act. They helped me to file a Right to Information application in the M.C.D. office regarding the status of the road. I was amazed to see that within twenty days of filing the complaint, the road got fully repaired. Not only this, the official asked me to give a satisfactory report after repairing the road.

Right to Information is a very empowering tool which can be used by even a common man to get any information and get the government machinery working.

- **Amrit Kaur**

I went with my husband to the concerned department for getting our address changed on the identity card (*pehchan patr*). The official refused to do so blatantly, without giving any reason. The officials harassed us to such an extent that he warned us that nobody will touch our work.

Someone told us that we should approach ISST Saathi Centre for this problem. At Saathi Centre, they suggested to file a Right to Information application, enquiring about the status of our application on identity card. We did the same, asking that why have they not made our identity card despite completion of all the required documents and proofs. The impact of the Right to Information complaint was so dramatic that the work that was jammed since more than two years was done in one month.

- **Meena Kaur**

I participated in a talk show on Lokh Sabha on the topic 'Right to Information Act, 2005'. After the programme, I requested them to give me a copy of the telecasted programme but they refused to do so. In response to this, I filed a Right to

Information application demanding the same but did not get any positive response from Lok Sabha Television.

only because of this empowering tool, Right to Information.

- **Ashkeen Ahmed**

It was only after I filed a second appeal that I got the C.D. from Lok Sabha. It was made possible
